Kicking off at Redhill

I started at Redhill School in KG1 at the age of 4. I began playing football around the age of 5 with the boys at school, as well as outside of school with my brother Tareq (he's also a Redhill Alumnus). At the age of 6, the boys at school started training with Mr Ngwenya on Oval field. I was advised to take ballet instead of football... that didn't last long and I ended up joining the boys anyway. It was way more fun, in my opinion. I continued playing and training while building close relationships with the boys at school - they were my football buddies. By the time I reached Grade 3, matches were being played against other schools which got me even more excited about the game. Redhill requested special permission at the time for me to play in the schools' league, which was for boys only. While I played with the boys at school, I was also receiving extra training externally to improve my skills. In Grade 5, I went overseas to play football for the first time with a local club (Sandton Parks FC) that some of the Redhill boys and I belonged to. It was an amazing opportunity for me to experience the competition outside of the country. Again, I was the only girl in that team.

In Grade 7, I was voted Soccer Captain at Redhill by my peers and was the first girl to do have done so (and hopefully not be the last!). We had an amazing season and I made unforgettable memories with the team and coaching staff. In Grade 8, I was unfortunately unable to continue playing football with the boys at school level. This was very frustrating and sad for me. There was a newly-founded girls' football team in the High School and I played for both the juniors and the seniors. However, I sought more of a challenge. I ended up having to leave Redhill to develop my football and education elsewhere. I soon received my first u17 South African National team call up, making my debut right before COVID struck, when I was limited to online training in my garden. A year later, I made the u20 South African National team in addition to being selected to play with the First team of the club I played for, JVW FC (Janine van Wyk) in the Hollywood Bets National Women's League.

Now, at the age of 18, I have just finished my matric and play professionally in Scotland for Glasgow City FC.

I am grateful to Redhill for supporting me and giving me the opportunity to learn, grow and play soccer with the boys in those early years.

Redhill School is the only school in South Africa that is in a position to offer students the choice between graduating with either an IB Diploma or IEB Senior Certificate. In other words, students now have the opportunity to choose either a local or international qualification!

Both are recognised by South African and International tertiary institutions.

What is the IB Diploma Programme?

This is an international programme, recognised by tertiary learning institutions worldwide. It is a challenging and

comprehensive two-year university-preparation programme, for students in Grade 11 and 12.

The IB Diploma Programme is research-based and develops disciplinary and interdisciplinary knowledge. Its holistic approach means that students engage in thinking and discussion, alongside independent research and community service.

At the end of 2022, our third cohort of students completed the IB Programme.

Since graduation, I moved to Los Angeles where I am pursuing a BFA in Film and Television Production at The University of Southern California. Due to my proximity to the film industry and the network I have access to through my school, I have had the opportunity of learning about film making firsthand through crewing on sets and attending some amazing events like prescreenings and premieres. I have loved my course so far! One of the highlights has probably been being able to work on a feature film set or sailing to Catalina for one of my classes, in addition to all the brilliant people I have met along the way.

An important way in which Redhill has helped me navigate university this year is the emphasis the school always had on creativity and critical thinking. From a young age, at Redhill I was allowed to incorporate my love for making films into almost every subject at one point or another. I feel that the school always encouraged me to engage with my school work according to what suited my learning, which sometimes meant looking at my coursework from a unique perspective. Matric of 2022

Just like that, our Class of 2022 enters the RedPath fold. A warm welcome to our newest alumni! We're certain they need no introduction after their incredible performance in their final examinations but we'll do it anyway!

The Class of 2022 had only just entered the senior school when the pandemic struck, so we are particularly proud of their tenacity, strength, and commitment. From online learning to red days and blue days, to being back on campus, they've been through it all. We are so proud of their efforts and would like to thank our incredibly talented staff and our supportive parents for their role in raising this village.

It's tough to highlight every achievement (newsletters are only so long, after all) but we'll do our best to cover the 'big hits' for both the IEB and the IB (International Baccalaureate). Redhill is the only school in South Africa to offer a choice between these options, so we don't really have an accurate, external benchmark – but on the plus side, we have two systems to celebrate!

IEB

Our IEB Class of 2022 achieved a 100% Bachelor Degree pass with a collective 320 distinctions, averaging 3.4 distinctions per student. 17% of our students received seven or more distinctions (a Full House) and 42% of our matrics received an A average.

61% of our IEB Maths students achieved a distinction! We also clearly have the 'it factor' (or should we say, 'IT factor') with **20 out of 24 IT students** receiving a distinction. Creativity continues to be a Redhillian strong suit, with **73% of our Dramatic Arts students** walking away with distinctions, as well as **67% of our Visual Arts students**, and **60% of our Music students**. Parlez-vous Français? We know we do, with 100% of our French students achieving a distinction!

Our students achieved **24 placements in the top 1%** for various subjects, including Accounting, Mathematics, Business Studies, Dramatic Arts, English Home Language, and Physical Sciences.

Our Dux Scholar (calculated on results achieved in English, Afrikaans/isiZulu, Mathematics, Life Orientation, and three of the highest option subjects excluding Further Studies) was **Charlotte Snyckers**

who achieved eight distinctions and an average of 93%, placing in the top 1% of candidates for Dramatic Arts and English Home Language as well as a Commendable Achievement Award. Sascha Bischoff scored a 93% average with eight distinctions as well as 100% in Mathematics, and Keranya Moodley achieved a 92% average with seven distinctions. Kristyn Sookdhew walked away with an astounding nine distinctions.

We had **eight students receive eight distinctions** (Kate Binnie, Sascha Bischoff, Yael Blass, Hannah Hulley, Aalia Mitha, Ariade Monadjem, Charlotte Snyckers, and Carl van Rooyen). Johara Abdool-Samad, Adrian Caldwell, Keranya Moodley, Lance Murray, Alexia Primikirios, Lily Segal, and Saianna Vandiar all scored **seven distinctions**.

We also celebrate our **eight** students who achieved six distinctions, another **ten** students who achieved five distinctions and **nine** students who achieved four distinctions

IB

Our IB students achieved a 100% Diploma pass and over a third of our cohort scored 36 points or higher, well above the global average. It also happens to be the benchmark result for acceptance to some of the most prestigious universities abroad, so we look forward to seeing those passport stamps in our students' futures.

As for our top achievers, **Sophia Abraham**, **Zandile Shamu**, and **Ella Tunbridge** form a triple threat, each scoring an impressive 39 points out of a potential 45. Ella also **achieved a perfect score** in her core subjects (Extended Essay, CAS, and Theory of Knowledge).

But, as Mr Gerassi indicated in his address at the matric breakfast, we also celebrate and acknowledge the students whose names aren't necessarily mentioned in the top achievers lists for the IEB and IB. The students who gave their final year everything they had, who strove to be the best version of themselves possible. For some, that was in the classroom. For others, it was on the stage or on the sports fields. We are proud of each and every student in our Class of 2022 for embodying the Redhill ethos. We can't wait to see what comes next – where you'll go, what you'll do, who you'll become. You are free to build, after all.
